
Name three things you like.

Name: Lindsey Barber

Where do you work? Stepping Hill Hospital, Stockport

What is your job/role? Research Nurse

What is your background? I was born and bred in Manchester, just a stone's throw from what is now the Trafford Centre. After school, I originally began a Business and IT degree but soon realised I really wanted to be a nurse, following in my mother's footsteps. I trained over the Peaks at The University of Sheffield and had a great experience of various specialities. Moving back home to Manchester after qualifying I worked at Manchester Royal Infirmary for a year before moving into community nursing, which is where I thought I'd stay forever... however, I heard from a friend about a research nurse/coordinator post in a private company that sounded very interesting and thought it would give me valuable experience of industry working. The job was a steep learning curve and I soon realised just how interesting and worthwhile medical research was, as I was overseeing and assisting studies being setting up and recruiting patients for 5 large hospitals around the North West. After leaving the company and having my son I saw my current post advertised at my local hospital and knew that I wanted to move back into a more patient focused role, still within research. I have now been here for 18 months and hope to remain for much longer still as there is so much opportunity for growth and development.

What are your research interests?

News items

We are now all set up for online data entry and many sites have started using it. The system we are using is an open source web based database called OpenClinica. Some of the first people in the study to use it described it as straightforward and simple to use. Please do let me know if you are having any issues with it though. Having on line data entry will allow us to review and analyse the data a lot quicker. Please do remember to let myself or Chloe know when you have filled in a CRF so we can check and complete it.




Reminder time

- We need more patients recruited <u>prior to LP</u> in order to get some extra CSF for the substudies – please remember if you are based on an acute medical ward. Thanks to those that are doing this – numbers are improving.
- We need more patients with TB meningitis remember they are eligible too
- Don't forget to check the <u>HSV type specific serology</u> on patients with HSV meningitis
- Don't forget to offer an <u>HIV test</u> to all patients with meningitis. HIV testing is still poor –
 individual site results will be issues to each site. Anonymised results are shown on page 5.
- Encourage juniors/ward staff to make sure <u>concurrent glucose</u> is done (whether in the study or not)
- Encourage <u>full viral PCR work up</u> in cases of aseptic meningitis, including stool and throat PCR for enterovirus
- Remember to ask patients if they would be willing to self take genital swabs if they have aseptic meningitis
- Remember to ask patients about **genital lesions** past and present.
- For patients who have consented to substudies please try and make sure the patient had
 the PAXgene sample taken as soon as possible preferably within 48 hours of admission.
- Remember to take the **second PAXgene sample** at 3-5 days/discharge.
