Where do you work? Royal Bolton Hospital What is your job/role?

CT1 in ACCS (Acute Care Common Stem) currently working in Acute Medicine. Basically a junior doctor on a medical ward. It's a busy admissions ward, but a great team of doctors and nurses make it a fun job.

What is your background? I was born in Bristol, but brought up in Newcastle-upon-Tyne. After school, I moved to Manchester to study Medicine at university. Apart from a brief stint back at Newcastle University for a year studying microbiology and immunology, I've remained in the North West ever since and plan to for the future. It's a great place full of friendly people and a fantastic atmosphere. I've worked at Royal Bolton Hospital since 2009. During that time I've worked in a number of different departments, including Emergency Medicine, Elderly Medicine, Surgery and Obstetrics & Gynaecology. I'll be moving in August to work at Salford Royal in Manchester.

What are your research interests?

Before this research project, my main experience had been at Newcastle University, where I undertook lab work into the potential improvement of treatments for children suffering from Respiratory Syncytial Virus infection. I was surprised with how much I enjoyed the laboratory aspect and I plan to expand these skills further.

I'll be trying to see relatives so will be going in between Northampton and Sheffield, and a few days back in Manchester (Working rather than relaxing, unfortunately!) What is your background? I was born in Airedale Hospital in 1979, which means I'm a child of the 70s. I grew up in the local area, and left school at 16 to train as an engineer! I kind of fell into nursing as a way to become a paramedic, but I enjoyed being on the wards so much that I stayed in nursing. After qualifying from the University of Bradford in 2007 I worked for a little time at Airedale on a Surgical Admissions unit. Very early in my training I was exposed to some of the prejudice and stigma associated with those living with HIV. My mentor at the time said something that has stuck with me over the last few years: "I don't care what the patient has got or how they got it. At the end of the day they're ill and need us to look after them. They're still a person no matter what they have" (thanks Alex). I had two goals for my nursing career: 1) to work in ICU and 2) work with those living with HIV. After completing my preceptorship at Airedale I jumped at the chance to work on Neuro ICU at Leeds. I worked there for 3 years – some of the most challenging years of my life both personally and professionally. So looking for a new challenge! This made me think about working with people with HIV. I spotted the Research Nurse job working with Dr Minton here in Leeds, applied straight away and here I am 6 months later with a near vertical learning curve and enjoying every minute!

What are your research interests?

Currently I'm working towards my BSc in Healthcare Practice. Two big projects I'm working on are examining the life cycle of HIV and how the types of treatment affect the virus. For my dissertation I am investigating whether being on treatment effects a persons risk-taking behaviour.


